ISCRR's mission is to collaboratively develop, execute and translate the highest quality research which helps the TAC and WorkSafe Victoria optimise their outcomes and those of their clients. Over the past 12 months we have undertaken a number of initiatives to achieve this mission, including:

- Substantial engagement with the TAC to assist the development of the TAC Strategy 2020
- Completion of numerous major occupational health and safety, return to work and health services projects
- Implementation of the final set of major projects under the four-year Neurotrauma Research Strategy
- Enhancing the Institute's research communication and translation capability to ensure that maximum value is extracted from our research program
- Continuing a strong program of educational and informational events for practitioners, policy-makers and researchers
- Growing the Institute's internal research capability and ability to respond to partners through strategic secondments and appointments
- Relocating the Institute to be co-located with WorkSafe in central Melbourne and the TAC in Geelong

The continued ability of the Institute to deliver valuable research demonstrates the effectiveness of the partnership model established by the TAC, WorkSafe and Monash University in ISCRR.

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OUTCOMES OF THE INSTITUTE'S ACTIVITIES

ISCRR and its partners have developed an approach to deriving value from research that involves coproduction of research projects, and engagement of researchers with policy and practice partners throughout the research process, including in communication and translation. The Institute also has policy and processes in place that ensure projects undertaken through ISCRR are of a high quality and build the knowledge base.

During 2015/16 ISCRR and its research network completed and delivered more research projects than it started. This marks a significant transition requiring the Institute to focus more effort on realising the benefit of completed research. Through ISCRR, the partners in the Institute have developed a substantial body of evidence, and are now in an excellent position to use this evidence to inform practice and policy.

During the year, a number of major projects delivered outcomes for the TAC and WorkSafe and several important activities emerged as the year progressed. A short summary of some key outcomes for the year are summarised below.

- Engaging with the TAC in the development of TAC's Strategy 2020 During 2015/16, ISCRR was involved in the development of TAC's Strategy 2020. The Institute provided expertise on key areas of interest to the TAC through short summaries, presentations and engagement with the TAC strategy working group. This has enabled the TAC and ISCRR to articulate a program of research for 2016/17 which directly aligns ISCRR's activities with the strategic objectives of TAC.
- Development of Leading Indicators for Workplace Safety Initiated by ISCRR in 2011 and led by Professor Helen de Cieri from Monash Business School, this project has adapted and validated a simple survey-based tool to assess leading indicators of occupational health and safety. The Organizational Performance Metric-Monash University (OPM-MU) can be used as a 'pulse check' of OHS leading indicators for workplaces in Australia. Aligned to this project the research team also developed and trialled with WorkSafe an inspector checklist designed to assist inspectors to assess leading indicators of safety.
- Ability to identify new and emerging technologies through the Horizon Scanning Program –
 Following a successful pilot conducted externally, the Horizon Scanning program was
 embedded within ISCRR and completed a scanning round. The program is designed to
 identify and characterise new and emerging technology and processes that will impact on
 Victorian OHS and injury compensation systems, providing an advance warning system for
 potential future disruption.
- Establishing the Victorian Injured Worker Outcomes Study This study, implemented by ISCRR during the year, addresses the Victorian Labor government commitment to inquire into the long-term health outcomes of injured workers, and to evaluate the impact of transition points in the workers' compensation scheme. During the year the study was established and reported early findings to a sector-wide steering committee.
- Training of 1200 physiotherapists to improve return to work outcomes for compensable clients – The implementation and evaluation of the Early Intervention Physiotherapy




Framework (EIPF) was completed early in the year, led by the Monash Department of Physiotherapy. To date, 1200 Victorian physiotherapists have been trained in the EIPF to deliver evidence-based practice in return to work and compensable injury management.

- Improving outcomes for Spinal Cord Injury through Immediate Cooling and Decompression Led by Dr Peter Batchelor from the University of Melbourne, this work has followed previous research conducted through the Institute that demonstrated that the benefits of decompression surgery are maximised when surgery is performed within a few hours of injury. The initial study found ways to improve time to surgery, and ways to reduce time pressure by deliberate cooling of the body. Work has commenced in preparation for a clinical trial of immediate cooling and emergency decompression in patients with cervical spinal cord injury.
- Facilitating the integration of worker health, safety and wellbeing through the WorkHealth Improvement Network Involving a joint Monash University and University of Melbourne research team this action-based research has trialled the WorkHealth Improvement Networks (WIN), and integrated workplace approaches to musculoskeletal disorders, mental health and safety culture. Researchers are continuing to evaluate the process, impacts and outcomes of the WIN program. The evaluation findings are being used by WorkSafe and the participating employers to refine and improve their work health and well-being programs.
- Linking claims and hospital data for greater insight ISCRR's data team linked WorkSafe's
 claims data to the Victorian hospital dataset and the Institute supported a study to analyse
 this data. The project will determine the impact of preinjury mental and physical health and
 service use on claim outcomes, and will seek to determine long-term outcomes of work
 injury in terms of claim duration, morbidity and mortality
- Informing a response to the Victorian Auditor General's Office (VAGO) Report,
 Occupational Violence Against Healthcare Workers ISCRR assisted in responding to the
 audit during 2015/16 by preparing a scoping project, examining state-wide data collection of
 routine reports on occupational violence in Victoria's 128 publically funded hospitals, and an
 evidence review of education and awareness campaigns targeted to address the problem of
 occupational violence in healthcare.
- Positioning ourselves to be better able to respond to our partners' needs During the year
 a number of organisational changes occurred that will enable ISCRR to deliver value to its
 funding partners. The included co-locating the Institute with WorkSafe and the TAC in
 Melbourne and Geelong, establishing a Partner Engagement Directorate to lead
 communication and translation of research findings with partners, and increasing our
 internal research capability through strategic secondments of expert OHS, law and
 compensation health researchers from Monash University.

OVERVIEW OF THE INSTITUTE'S RESEARCH ACTIVITIES IN 2015/16

The 2015/16 financial year was the 7th full year since ISCRR's inception on 1 April 2009. During the year, ISCRR developed and finalised research projects from both Research Institute Collaboration Agreements and the Neurotrauma Funding Agreement. A short summary of the activities delivered by the Institute against each of these agreements during the 2015/16 financial year is provided below.

Activities under the Neurotrauma Funding Agreement

Five new neurotrauma projects commenced this year. Three of these aimed at the delivery of better bladder management outcomes for clients with spinal cord injury:

- Bladder Management Post Spinal Cord Injury in the Community
- Bladder Management Post Spinal Cord Injury Practice Change at the Victorian Spinal Cord Service
- Evaluation of Outcomes Following the Practice Change Project

The further two projects are focused towards better mental health treatment and care for clients with moderate to severe traumatic brain injury:

- Behaviours of Concern Positive Behavioural Supports Intervention and Evaluation
- Development of Guidelines for Pharmacological Management of Neurobehavioural Symptoms Following Traumatic Brain Injury

All projects are well underway with the first of the bladder management studies complete and findings reported to the TAC. Additional projects from the Neurotrauma Agreement began to deliver valuable results over the past year, including:

- Immediate Cooling and Emergency Decompression for the Treatment of Spinal Cord Injury
- Assessing Nutritional Status after Spinal cord Injury

Research communication activities:

In 2015/16, ISCRR undertook the following research communication and translation activities related to the Neurotrauma Agreement:

- 'The Journey Through Brain Injury' community forum and expo (Geelong, August 2015)
- Presentation of research findings on housing and technology for people with an acquired brain injury support (Brain Injury Research Seminar)
- Production of an extensive summary of research outputs 'Neurotrauma Research Projects 2011–2015'



Activities under Research Institute Collaboration Agreements

The past year saw the completion of a significant body of OHS-focused work. Projects that were completed ranged from the development of a Community of Practice in Safety Climate and Safety Culture and a project that examined safety communication in the workplace, to the delivery of key projects that have delivered evidence-based tools for use by WorkSafe and industry to enhance workplace OHS. Finalised projects include:

- Leading Indicators of Health and Safety
- Safety Culture and Safety Climate Definitions, Assessment Tools and Community of Practice
- Learning Lessons from Workplace Musculoskeletal Disorders Framework for Reporting and Investigation

Additionally, the research around return to work was further added to with the commencement of the Victorian Injured Worker Outcomes Study (VIWOS) in 2015. This study is expected to deliver substantial benefits to WorkSafe in understanding of long-term outcomes for injured workers.

ISCRR ACTIVITY

The Institute's internal capability includes a small data team focusing on OHS and compensation analytics, an evidence review program conducting worldwide evidence scanning, as well as research communication and translation functions. The Institute has also further developed its network of research experts across Monash University and other universities that conduct the bulk of research projects.

Below is a brief description of outputs in 2015/16 against each of ISCRR's six functional areas.

EVIDENCE REVIEWS

Client outcomes

- Informal caregivers: outcomes and supports review of the literature to identify what factors contribute to a positive as opposed to negative caregiver outcome.
- Ageing with a disability investigation of the potential association between traumatic brain injury and the risk of dementia or Alzheimer's disease development.

Occupational Health and Safety

- Occupational violence in healthcare campaigns review – identification of the drivers of occupational violence in healthcare and review of campaigns reported in the literature targeting public awareness and education.
- Comparison of the current MSD code with international tools – review to identify how the current risk assessment worksheets compare with other worksheets/checklists or ergonomic assessment tools currently used internationally.
- Supply chain safety mapping a whole of supply chain systems approach to addressing workplace safety risk management.
- Integrated approaches to health and safety promotion/prevention – investigation of new reports of integrated approaches to worker health, wellbeing and safety that have been evaluated in the literature.
- Association between OHS amongst hospital staff and patient outcomes – review of the evidence around whether the relationship between positive health and safety for staff flows through into patient safety.
- Vulnerable workers an investigation of the factors contributing to the increased OHS risk profile of vulnerable migrant workers both nationally and internationally, as well as potential solutions.
- Vulnerable workers: precarious/temporary employment – review to examine the association between temporary employment and health/OHS injury outcomes.

Return to work

 Occupational rehabilitation programs – assessing the effectiveness of occupational rehabilitation programs, with a focus on whether programs are effective in assisting injured workers to return to paid employment.

System

• Common law – synthesis of ISCRR-led research into the association between the common law process and health outcomes for injured Victorians.

Clinical effectiveness

 The effectiveness of telemedicine for clients with mental health conditions – literature review of telemedicine for mental health conditions including depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and adjustment disorder.

DATA ANALYSIS

Claim trends

- WorkSafe claims with elective/spinal surgeries outcomes of elective surgeries compensated by WorkSafe.
- Health service use of injured workers understanding long-term trends of health service.
- Rollout and impact of the new medical certificates of capacity – analysing the impact of the new certificate of capacity on certification practice and return to work outcomes.
- Claims of vulnerable workers in Victoria analysis of the claims of workers who have used interpreter services due to lack of English proficiency. This contributed to a submission to the Victorian Inquiry into the Labour Hire Industry and Insecure Work.

Occupational Health and Safety

- Occupational violence in healthcare campaign review understanding the incidence and causes of occupational violence in healthcare to inform the evidence review.
- WorkHeath Check data integration included the transfer, preparation, management and analysis of the dataset collected through the WorkHealth Check program. Analysis of the data has been undertaken including evaluating the uptake of the WorkHealth program, exploring the determinants of the risk of developing cardiovascular diseases and type 2 diabetes, as well as exploring the association between occupation, biomedical outcomes and self-rated health for workers in Victoria.

Return to work

- Return to work case conferencing identified characteristics of injured workers involved in case conferencing and emerging patterns in the uptake of case conferencing services.
- Comparative return to work analysis focused on the daily patterns of return to work around injured workers in Victoria which identified major patterns now being investigated further.
- Analysis on the impact of excess days on return to work outcomes – impact of longer excess days on return to work outcomes of injured workers in Victoria.

Notes to the Statement of Income and Expenditure

The Institute for Safety, Compensation and Recovery Research ("ISCRR") was established in April 2009 under the Research Institute Collaboration Agreement (the "Agreement") between the Transport Accident Commission "TAC", WorkSafe Victoria "WSV" and Monash University "Monash" for the purpose of acting as a centre of excellence to facilitate research and best practice in the areas of injury prevention, rehabilitation and compensation practice and to improve outcomes in those areas. ISCRR is an unincorporated entity not established for the purpose of making a profit. The management structure of ISCRR consists of the Board, the Relationship Management Committee and the Chief Executive Officer.

Operationally, ISCRR is part of Monash and is located within the Office of the Provost and Senior Vice President. Monash provides the ancillary assistance and resources towards the conduct of ISCRR activities and is responsible for the accounting function. There is no separate bank account for ISCRR as all monies are paid to and administered by Monash. All employees of ISCRR are employed by Monash and salary and on costs are recharged to ISCRR.

The original RICA ("2009 RICA") expired on 30 June 2013 and the new RICA ("2013 RICA") was signed by the 3 parties for the period from 1 January 2014 to 30 June 2018.

The budget for 2015-2016 referred to a recipient faculty as MIRI (Monash Injury Research Institute) Subsequent to a Monash internal restructure, all MIRI work is now conducted within MUARC (Monash University Accident Research Centre).

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The statement of income and expenditure has been prepared solely for the purpose of compliance with the Agreement between TAC, WSV and Monash and is based on the accounting policies listed below:

(a) Revenue recognition

Funding revenue is recognised when calls are made on funding agencies in accordance with respective funding agreements in the operating statement to correspond to the period to which the research project and operating expenditure are allocated.

Core funding revenue relates to the contribution as set out in the agreement between TAC, WSV and Monash, adjusted for the carry forward amount from the previous financial year. 2009 RICA and Neurotrauma will be invoiced annually based on budgeted expenditure for the forthcoming year.

External funding revenue relates to contribution other than in relation to the above mentioned agreements.

(b) Interest income

Interest income is recognised on an accrual basis and is earned on funds in the ISCRR cost centre accounts held in bank accounts maintained by Monash. These funds are invested in accordance with Monash's approved treasury policy and interest earned is returned to ISCRR as revenue for use in ISCRR activities.

(c) Recognition and allocation of expenditure

Funding for research projects is recognised as expenditure when funding is transferred to project funds in accordance with the approved Project Plans. The balance of project funds is

held and managed by Project Leaders for payment of research costs and expenses until the completion of the projects. All other expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis.

Staff salaries and on costs including operating costs not directly attributable to research projects but incurred in undertaking research activities are allocated to Research expenditure. All other costs are allocated to Research Development and Translation or Operations expenditure.

(d) Employee benefits

No provision is made for benefits accruing to employees in respect of annual leave, long service leave and superannuation as these benefits have been included in the salary and on costs recharged to ISCRR.

(e) Monash ancillary assistance and resources

Total expenditure in the operating statement includes the cost of ancillary assistance and resources directly attributable to the conduct of ISCRR activities which has been provided by Monash as set out in the agreement between TAC, WSV and Monash. The value of such ancillary assistance and resources provided is recognised as contribution by Monash and as revenue to ISCRR. In addition, Monash also provides research infrastructure support for ISCRR projects conducted by Monash organisational units, where overheads are not fully funded via ISCRR. Infrastructure support includes the cost of space, utilities, purchasing/leasing and maintenance of any permanent infrastructure available to the research team. The value of infrastructure support provided by Monash is not recognised in these financial statements.

(f) Accumulated funds

Accumulated fund represents the accumulated unspent funds of revenue less deduction for expenditure incurred to reporting date.

(g) Rounding

The amounts in the financial statement are rounded off to the nearest thousand dollars unless otherwise indicated.
